With the retirement of longtime Islip educators
Diane Druckman and Vince Veglia, the Board of Education and administration were tasked with finding their replacements. Following numerous applications and interviews, the Islip School District has welcomed Dr.
Maureen Martin and Mr. Christopher Smalley as the new principals of Maud S. Sherwood and Wing elementary schools, respectively.

A former elementary special education teacher and assistant principal, Dr. Martin shares Islip's vision of educating the whole child. It is her love of learning and depth of knowledge that will enable her to assume the principal responsibilities of the Maud S. Sherwood Elementary School. Dr. Martin's knowledge of elementary curriculum and instruction is comprehensive and, according to Superintendent of Schools Susan A. Schnebel, may only be surpassed by her enthusiasm and energy.

"I am looking forward to working with the community, parents, staff and students at Sherwood Elementary School," said Dr. Martin. "I feel fortunate to be part of the leadership team in the Islip School District."

An adjunct instructor for Long Island University, Mr. Smalley has also been an elementary teacher and an assistant principal. He is a collaborative leader who has a vision for student learning.

A Message from the Superintendent

Dear School Community Members,

Welcome to the 2013-14 school year!

Several weeks ago the New York State Education Department released the scores for English language arts and math assessments in grades 3-8. It is important to recognize that student achievement did not go down; the new standards have gone up. As Commissioner of Education Dr. John B. King Jr. stated in a letter to parents and families (see letter posted on the District website, www.islip.ufsd.org), "I want to make it very clear that the change in test scores does not mean that students are learning less or that teachers and schools are performing worse than last year." These new assessments do not accurately reflect our students' ability, nor the skills of the staff, and the scores should not be compared to the prior year's assessment results. These are "new baseline measurements of student learning." New York State accelerated the adoption of these new assessments, which are aligned to the new Common Core. Simply, the rules changed in the middle of the game.

We are confident that scores will improve as the Common Core is fully implemented. As we move forward, we will analyze the student scores and utilize the data to assist us in determining academic support, curriculum design and professional development for teachers.

We take great pride in the quality of education we provide and stand by our students, staff and community.

ACHIEVE3000

In January 2013, the district piloted the Achieve3000 program, a computer-assisted instruction program designed to increase student achievement in reading and writing, for secondary ESL students.

"Use of the reading and writing elements within Achieve3000 language art activities helps students to develop the capacities recommended by the Common Core Standards," explained Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Ellen Semel. "Our students who piloted the program saw substantial improvement in their scores."

The web-based, differentiated instruction program teaches students at their individual reading levels and constantly challenges them to achieve the next level. Students receive articles that have been written on 12 different levels on the same subject and take a placement test to guarantee they receive instruction and text at their appropriate level. According to Achieve3000's website, the result of the continually adjusting content includes "heightened engagement, a stepped approach to reading comprehension and critical thinking and extraordinary gains in reading/writing proficiency."

With the differentiated online instruction, the district saw significant gains in student Lexile (reading gains) points. According to Mrs. Semel, Achieve3000 projected that the Lexile point gains for Islip's students through the piloted program would be 19.8. However, the actual mean gain was 36.7 Lexile points, exceeding the projected expectation by 16.9 points.

The program, which will be expanded for the 2013-14 school year, helps students build strong content knowledge, comprehend and critique content, value evidence, and demonstrate strategic use of technology and digital media.

NOTEWORTHY RESULTS

In the district's ongoing efforts to raise achievement standards for all students, Islip Middle School once again saw significant results in state tests for 2012-2013. Eighth-graders participating in the New York State Earth Science Regents exam saw a passing rate of 99.9 percent, with a mastery of 84 percent. Additionally, the middle school received an 88 percent passing rate of all eighth-grade students – general education and special education – taking the Integrated Algebra Regents.

"This continuation of last year's noteworthy results is a testament to our teachers and their instructional expertise and passion for teaching that make the difference in the lives of their students," said Superintendent of Schools Susan A. Schnebel.

BOARD ADOPTS GOALS

Every July, the Board of Education works together as a cohesive unit to create goals they would like to accomplish throughout the upcoming school year. For the 2013-14 school year, the Islip Board has adopted specific goals, one of which is creating a governance document to: 1) assist current and future Board members on the proper practices and procedures for Board service, 2) increase transparency, 3) expand upon the Board's community outreach and 4) work to seek mandate relief and fiscal support from the government.

The governance document, once finalized, will include what one should know when considering running for the Board, the scope of Board vs. superintendent responsibility and authority, and the process to address/redress complaints, thereby providing greater transparency. Additionally, the Board plans to develop a consistent outreach and communication strategy with all community groups beyond

the community council and will attend school events and community meetings, including PTA, Friends of the Arts and Booster Club events. The Board will also create a strong legislative arm to provide outreach and collaborate with others within Islip and beyond to address the need for mandate relief and fiscal support from New York State and the federal government.

To remain updated on the progress of the Board's goals and to stay connected to the goings-on within the district, please attend upcoming meetings. Board meetings are typically held on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the board room at the high school, unless otherwise noted. The next scheduled meeting of the Board of Education will take place on Tuesday, Sept. 10. Please visit the district's website, www.islipufsd.org, for any changes to the Board schedule.

Provides Enhanced Communication

Parents now have the opportunity to take advantage of a new communication tool created by the district, Parent Portal. A feature of Infinite Campus, Parent Portal provides parents with secure access to attendance and grade information on their children from any computer with Internet access, anywhere in the world. Once parents have activated an online account, they can use the portal to view their child's attendance, schedule, New York State assessment scores, immunization records, current year progress reports and report cards, district and school notices, teacher newsletters and notices, and, for students at the high school, parents can access information on behavioral issues.
