

This gives you instant access to your child's progress in school since their grades appear on the portal as soon as they are posted to the system. Additionally, this access has now afforded us the opportunity to "Go Green" as well as to be fiscally responsible. We will not be sending home paper copies of progress or grades report cards, until the fourth and final marking period of the year.

A quick review of this newsletter reveals that our students have been very busy and have numerous opportunities to become involved in school activities. A student who is involved in school clubs and/or sports is more likely to also enjoy the academics during the school day. This is verified by the fact that for the 2008-2009 school year all 22 high school athletic teams were recognized as Scholar-Athlete Teams. As a result Islip High School was named a School of Distinction by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association. Islip High School received this prestigious recognition because all of the schools' athletic teams maintained an average of 90 or above.

Our students are stretching and attaining new heights as responsible young adults. The College Board's Advanced Placement Program (AP) provides motivated and academically prepared students with the opportunity to take rigorous college level courses while still in high school. Forty-three students have earned AP Scholar Awards in recognition of their exceptional achievement on AP exams. We are very proud of them and thank you for the support you provide us.



Freshmen First News

The school year has started off with a great deal of activities to assist our students in getting back into the swing of things. The freshmen participated in the Freshmen Orientation Program on *Wednesday, September* 2nd. They were welcomed to the High School by Dr. Rossman, Principal; Mr. Juengerkes, Assistant Principal for 11th and 12th grades; Mr. Pramataris, Assistant Principal for 9th and 10th grades; Ms Garmendia, Director of School Counseling and the counselors, Mrs. Doheny, Ms. Friend, Mrs. Gould, Mr. Jargo and Ms. Picinich. Mrs. Gordon spoke to the students about having a fresh start in high school and about getting involved and making high school a fun, as well as an educational, experience. The students were then given their Student Planners, ID cards and a tour of the building. Most students reported that it was very helpful and made the start of school less stressful.

The counselors are in the process of meeting individually with their freshmen as well as in small groups. These groups will focus on getting to know the students and helping them to get involved in the school.

Freshmen Horizons, the first in a series of special programs designed for the freshmen, will be presented on *Wednesday*, *October 14th*. Activities that day will include career presentations from professionals in the areas of Law Enforcement, Building & Construction and Health Care. Additionally, the counselors will continue the process of getting to know the Freshmen with a series of "Team Building" activities in the gym.

An updated copy of the official transcript with the student's GPA and rank was mailed home on **Tuesday**, **September 29**, **2009**. If you did not receive the transcript please contact your child's counselor for an updated copy.

Islip High School Fall Mini College Fair - On *Tuesday, October 6, 2009* the School Counseling Department hosted its fall Mini College Fair from 8:00 to 9:00 a.m. in the High School's Auxiliary Gym. Approximately 80 colleges participated and were available to meet with the students.

Financial Aid Night - On *Thursday, December 3, 2009* the School Counseling Department will host a Financial Aid Workshop on the ins & outs of financing a college education and filling out the FAFSA. It will be held in Room 130 in the High School at 7:00 p.m. Parents from all grade levels are welcome!

Seniors:

- 1. If you have applications that are due at the college by January 1, 2010, they must be submitted to your counselor by **Friday**, **November 20, 2009**.
- **2.** If you plan to play college sports and have registered with NCAA on-line, please don't forget to give your counselor the Transcript Request form to make sure that your transcript gets sent to the NCAA. Also be sure to complete the NCAA worksheet with your counselor to make sure you have a qualifying GPA in your core courses.
- **3.** If you are using the **Common Application** to apply to colleges, make sure you check to see if a particular college requires a supplement to the Common Application. i.e. Providence College.

Tips for Students from Washington University

MANAGING THE COLLEGE APPLICATION PROCESS

ACADEMICS COME FIRST:

Remember that colleges are most interested in your academic progress, including your <u>senior year</u> **courses and grades.** Be sure that you are taking the time that you need to do well in your classes.

KEEP DOING WHAT YOU LOVE:

Continue involvement in activities that you are most passionate about. Avoid pressure to fill your schedule with many new extracurricular activities during your senior year to "pad" your resume: <u>the</u> **depth of your commitment is more important.**

STAY ORGANIZED AND PAY ATTENTION TO DEADLINES:

Keep a folder for every school in which you are interested. Use it for brochures, financial aid information and applications. Keep photocopies of all admission and scholarship forms. **It is your responsibility to submit materials on time**. Write application requirements and deadlines on the outside of the folder, and check-off your progress as you go.

RESPECT THE TIME OF THOSE HELPING YOU:

Teachers use their personal time to write recommendations and counselors have many other students to assist. **Don't wait until the last minute to ask for a recommendation or ask for help.**

FAMILY MATTERS:

Keep in touch with your family as you are embarking on this exciting endeavor. The application should be the work of the student, but families should talk regularly about the choices and challenges that come with it. When the good news arrives in the mail, be sure to make time to celebrate together!

The Guidance Department would like to remind students who are planning to take SAT's, SAT II's or ACT's this fall of the upcoming deadlines for registration. Please contact your counselor to discuss what tests are appropriate for you.

The form is due back in the Guidance Office by **Monday, December 14, 2009.** If you would like another copy of the application, they are available in the Guidance Office or on the Guidance page of the website.

Sophomore Class Meeting - On **Friday, September 11, 2009** Dr. Rossman, Mr. Juengerkes, Mr. Pramataris and Ms. Garmendia met with the Class of 2012. Many topics of interest were discussed with the sophomores including a **Three-Year Planning Calendar** and NCAA requirements to play college sports, which was distributed to all students present.

Sophomores and **Juniors** will take the PSAT exam on **Wednesday, October 14, 2009** at the High School during periods 1 through 4. This exam gives students a first look at the type of questions they can expect on the SAT. It is broken up into five sections: two 25-minute critical reading sections; two 25-minute math sections; and one 30-minute writing skills section. Juniors should also be aware that this exam is used to determine eligibility for the National Merit Scholarship Program.

All students should be aware of the <u>Class Drop Policy</u> which appears on page 20 of the Student Planner.


For a **Full-Year Course**, students will have until five (5) school days after the end of the FIRST Quarter (11/13/09) to drop a full year class without penalty.





H1N1 Influenza A Recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control

When should my child stay When should my child home with the flu?

Students with "Influenza-Like Illness" stay home when they are sick. Your child may have the flu and should stay home if they have the following signs and symptoms:

> Fever of 100°F (37.8° C) or greater Cough Runny Nose Sore Throat

It is recommended that students stay home until at least 24 hours after they are free of fever [100°F (37.8° C) or greater] or signs of a fever, without the use of feverreducing medications.



What can we do to reduce the chances of spreading or "catching" H1N1 Influenza?

- Wash hands often with soap and water, especially after coughing or sneezing
- Use alcohol based hand sanitizers to clean hands if soap and water are not available
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing or sneezing and throw the tissue in the trash after use (if no tissue is available, cough or sneeze into your arm or sleeve-not your hand)

The College Board announced Gregory Antonelli, Jason Balsamo, Emilie Bui, Alexa Capuano, Karen Gambina, Kaber Karimi, Robert Lycke, Samantha Rodriguez, Debbie Schram, Kristen Tramposch, and Daniel Wexler earned AP Scholar Awards on the basis of their outstanding academic performance on AP Exams. The College Board's Advanced Placement Program provides motivated and academically prepared students with the opportunity to take rigorous college-level courses while still in high school and to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams. Eight Islip students qualified for the National AP Scholar Award by earning an average grade of 4 or higher on a five-point scale on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 4 or higher ano; Greg Antonelli and Emilie Bui. on eight or more of these exams. The students who

earned AP Scholar awards were Gregory Antonelli, Jason Balsamo, Emilie Bui, Alexa Capuano, Samantha Rodriguez, Debbie Schram, Kristen Tramposch and Daniel Wexler. Karen Gambina qualified for the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning an average grade of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams. Kaber Karimi and Robert Lycke qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average grade of at least 3.254 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.

Through more than 30 different college-level courses and exams, AP provides motivated and academically prepared students with the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced placement and stand out in the col-

lege admissions process. Each exam is developed by a committee of college and university faculty and AP teachers, ensuring that AP exams are aligned with the same high standards expected by college faculty at some of the nation's leading liberal arts and research institutions. More than 3,600 colleges and universities annually receive AP grades. Over 90 percent of four-year colleges in the United States provide credit and/ or placement for qualifying exam grades. Research consistently shows that AP students who score a 3 or higher on AP Exams typically experience greater academic success in college and higher graduation rates than students who do not participate in AP.
